


Curry Mallet Preschool

Notes from the Farm

There has long been a niche market for farmers providing kosher food for Britain's small Jewish population. Kosher milk production, for example, requires farmers to accept a few limitations on what cows are fed and then before the milk is collected a rabbi will turn up and say some prayers over the tank and then seal it shut. Of course the point at which this subject becomes contentious is in meat production as there is a religious exemption from the animal welfare laws that require animals to be pre-stunned at the point of slaughter.

The situation with the much larger Muslim population is more complex. A similar exemption from the law exists, but many though not all Muslims are content to eat meat from animals that have been pre-stunned and in fact over 80% of Halal meat in the UK has been slaughtered in this way. Animals which have been ritually slaughtered in both Kosher and Halal can be deemed to not meet the religious standards for other reasons yet be ok for general consumption, in other words those of us outside these communities may be unwittingly eating it. In the case of Halal the amount of meat produced vastly exceeds the use by the Muslim population, and some organisations have started providing only Halal meat now as a default as it simplifies their supply chain.

There are currently 24 plants in the UK performing non-stun slaughter. Some of these also use the prestunned method and are allowed to self-certify, so even if you google the numerical code on your packaging you may be unable to be sure of what you are eating. A lot of our work in the food industry is geared to enabling consumers to make informed choices, but on this issue which would seem to me to be one of the most important of all we have a glaring anomaly. One way to clarify this would be to ban non-stun slaughter outright. Seven European countries have done this, but I suspect there is no political appetite for doing this here in the current climate.

Saturday 20th December Carols in the cow shed 6pm Park Farm.


Sunday 21st December BCP Communion 8.30am at All Saints.

Having finally finished the mammoth task of preparing our Great Hall for the public (after which neither of us ever want to open another cardboard box of assorted decades-old paraphernalia as long as we live), we now have a space fit for a Baron ready to be hired for parties, exhibitions, weddings, funerals and much else besides. It's also a nice place for a pot of tea, being open regularly as part of the Tea Room.

Given that Curry Mallet seems to boast an utterly disproportionate number of fine artists amongst its population, it seemed only right to use this newly-available space to



celebrate some of that local talent. Our first such exhibition was one very close to our hearts. Many of you will no doubt have heard of the passing of our neighbour, Haydn Whitehouse, noted in the previous issue of the Beer & Curry in an eloquent tribute by Chris Marks which rightly highlighted his skill as an artist, honed through a long career in Commercial Art. We were honoured to have been able to showcase his fine and varied output of art when we hosted his wake, and for a time afterward as an exhibition, and we thank his widow Monica sincerely for entrusting us with his works to share with others from the village and beyond. Our current exhibition features another Curry Mallet artist of great talent, Brian Sweet, whose works range from dramatic nautical battles to colourful and lively depictions of historic beauty spots around the South West and the wider country - many of which are available for purchase.

There are many more things to look forward to here as well. As always, we will be open on Halloween night for the unique trick-or-treat experience of a truly haunted Manor. As this will be the first time our whole Great Hall will be open for haunting, it should be the best one yet! Any funds we raise on the night will be going towards a new Village Noticeboard open to all in the community, which is planned to be situated outside our boundary wall, near the existing Parish Council noticeboard.

The very next day, of course, will be another one for the calendar, with the much-anticipated Auction of Promises for the CMB Community Pub Group taking place at the Village Hall. Of the many exciting prizes which the community have gone above and beyond to put together, we have been able to add a few to the pile, including custom-commissioned works of art and unlimited tea and coffee at the Tea Room for two whole months!

Finally, the annual Christmas Light Switch-On now has a date! You can join us the Adamses and Chris and Adrian outside the Curry Mallet Coffee Shop from 5:30pm on December 4th to prepare for switching on at 6pm - complete with the added bonus of musical accompaniment by the talented Giles Adams for carol-signing to really get the festive spirit going.

News from Curry Mallet Parish Council

You may not be aware, but the Duchy of Cornwall own the land that the village hall and play area is built on, along with the playing field for the school. The Village Hall Committee have been paying the rent for the village hall and land, whilst the Parish Council pays the rent for the playing field at the school.

The present Duke (HRH Prince William, Prince of Wales, Duke of Cornwall) has offered a rent abatement to all charities renting from the Duchy from 1st April 2025 and this will stay in place until the present Duke is no longer Duke of Cornwall or the Duchy is no longer the landlord. This means that the Village Hall Committee and the Parish Council no longer pay rent to the Duchy of Cornwall.

The Parish Council is undertaking some projects around the village:

Installation of a new wooden notice board near the Manor House. This will give enough room for community events, along with Parish Council notices. We will ensure that it will be placed in a safer area that the current noticeboard. Quotes are currently being sought.

A small working party will be convened to clear the debris that has accumulated in sheepwash and to clear part of the water course that flows into sheepwash. This will be ongoing.

Somerset Council have limited finances and are charging town and parish councils for services that might have been offered free of charge in the past. One of these is scaling back the ditch and culvert clearing maintenance. The PC is investigating how it might ensure ditches and culverts are cleared for the winter. If you are aware of a problem area, please contact one of your Parish Councillors or email the Clerk: clerk@currymallet-pc.gov.uk
